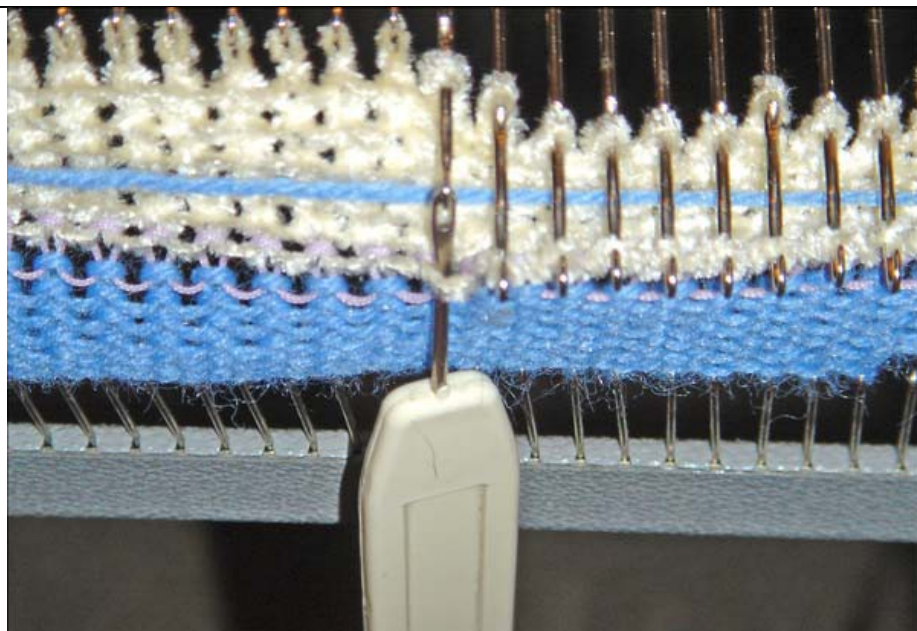


How To Do An Easy Casing ~ Sample knit on KnitKing CompuKnit III

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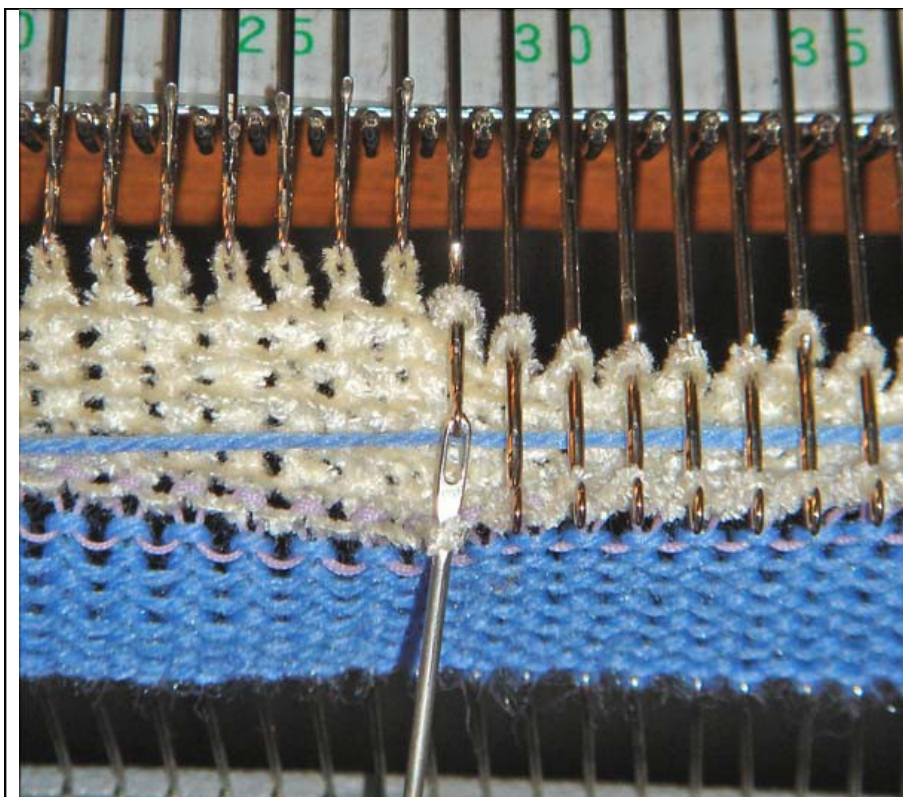
When I need to pull elastic or ribbon through a narrow casing, I do it while I'm closing the casing on the machine.

This example at the left has waste yarn, then ravel cord and then 6 rows - it needed to be very narrow for the elastic.

The thread in there is what I call the **Pulling Thread**.



I laid the **Pulling Thread** in the 'trough' between the stitches on the machine and the stitches I was hanging onto the same needles when closing the casing.



Keep the **Pulling Thread** in the trough as you go along, making sure you do **NOT** let it catch on the needles or with the yarn. Every once in awhile, I'll pause my work and make sure the **Pulling Thread** is still free of any catches by taking both ends and sliding it back and forth.

It's a LOT easier to correct any issues with the **Pulling Thread** as you go along rather to find out once you take the work off the machine that **OOPS!**, it's caught!!

Once you're done, just attach your elastic or ribbon or whatever to one end of the **Pull Thread** and you'll be able to easily pull it through your casing.
